## Class Participation

Includes attendance and active, positive contributions to classes. Study the vocabulary, the grammatical structures, and the Lecturas,intermedias sections for the corresponding class. Review the exercises in your textbook, the Workbook/Video Manual, the Interactive CD-ROM and any other appropriate ancillaries before each class. The instructor reserves the right to adjust the final grade of students whose failure to actively participate in class or the tutorial has adversely affected their overall performance.

## In Class Dialogue

Activity based on the section En otras palabras of the Texbook, Minidiálogos in the Cuaderno de ejercicios, Lecturas intermedias or on any other topic of interest. This activity will be done in groups of three or four students with individual evaluation. Maximum ten minutes.

## Midterms

Two Midterms ( 50 minutes each). Each Midterm will be based on the following: Midterm I, Capítulos 1, 2, 3; Midterm II, Capítulos 4 and 5. There will be questions on vocabulary, grammatical structures and the Lecturas Intermedias. Exams might include review questions from the previous chapters. No books, notes or dictionaries are allowed. See Midterm-Test Practice in Blackboard.

## Compositions- Redacciones

Two compositions. The compositions are based on topics given in the textbook. Each composition will be worth $10 \%$ of your final grade. They will both be written in class ( 50 minutes). For the compositions, please consider: vocabulary, grammatical structures, organization of the sentences and paragraphs, and an appropriate content related to the suggestions in the textbook. Remember the general presentation of your work, spelling, capital letters, accents, questions and exclamations signs, etc.

## Outside class Activities

You will have the opportunity to practice your Spanish in the Calgary community. This can be either through the University (Centro de Tertulia, Latino American Studies, Education, etc.) or through a community based organization of your choice. Your instructor will approve your activity beforehand and you will have to provide proof of your involvement. If you participate in this program please inform your instructor, so this activity could count for the 5\% of the In class Dialogue.

## Final Oral Exam

30 minutes ( 20 minutes preparation, 10 minutes dialogue), outside of class time during the last weeks of the semester. This exam will be taken in groups of three or four students. Each group will be given a topic 20 minutes before the exam. Then each group will prepare the dialogue to be presented to the instructor for evaluation. Students might use notes for guidance but should refrain from reading a prepared text during this exam. Evaluations and grades will be assessed individually. This exam will include some additional questions from the instructor.

## Final Written Exam

Scheduled by the Registrar. Two hours. Includes Capítulos 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 . There will be questions on vocabulary, grammatical structures and Lecturas intermedias. This exam also includes a short composition. No books or dictionaries are allowed. No cellular phone or any other electronic devices are allowed.
