Course Description

This course is designed to offer instruction in topical and timely areas of interest in the study of law and society, criminology and criminal justice (e.g., crime and media, community development, victims of crime, animal law). Learners will be invited to read, critically analyze and debate issues surrounding our criminal justice system.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should have demonstrated the following knowledge and *skills*:

- 1. Reflect on the organization and delivery of the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 2. Identify some of the main challenges that exist within the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 3. Assess the extent to which the Canadian criminal justice system meets the needs of diverse groups.
- 4. Debate possible solutions to deficiencies in our Canadian criminal justice system.
- 5. Recommend and justify reforms to the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 6. Draw *defensible conclusions* after identifying, assessing, and synthesizing pertinent resources (i.e., scholarly and disciplinary literacy), including textual and audiovisual sources.
- 7. Contribute effectively to *teamwork*, including *advance preparation* and *constructive comments* on the work of peers.
- 8. *Present ideas*, verbally and in writing, in ways that *enhance learning for others*.

Course Format

This course will run fully *synchronous (live)* every Tuesday from 11-2 via Zoom. Links will be posted through D2L.

Learning Resources

Selected readings/materials and their links will be posted on D2L. There is no course textbook. Please complete your weekly readings prior to the start of class.

Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.
