**Course Objectives**

Sociology is the systematic study of social behavior and human groups. Therefore, as the scientific study of the actions of individuals in groups, sociology helps us to recognize the patterns of social organization as well as offer plausible explanations for individual behaviour and function. In this course we will examine four main theoretical traditions in sociology: Functionalism, Conflict Theory, Symbolic Interactionism and Feminism. We will also discuss several different methodologies used by sociologists to test their ideas. In addition, under the guise of social stratification, we will analyze culture, race, ethnicity and nascent patterns of class and gender inequality in Canada and abroad. Finally, we will investigate the social forces that shape health and aging, deviance, and urbanization.

Brym, R.J. (Ed.). (2011). *New society* (6th ed.). Toronto: Nelson. It is important to purchase this edition of the text.

Students are expected to read each assigned reading before class and to make use of power point slides available on Blackboard. Please note that these slides do not represent an exhaustive set of notes and are not an alternative to attending classes and tutorials.

If at all possible you must provide advance notice to the instructor if you are unable to take a test or pass in an assignment or essay on time.
