### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course offers an introduction to the sociology of gender and gender relations. We will explore how gender differences are created, maintained, transformed and represented on the individual, interactional, institutional and socio-cultural level. Furthermore, we will examine how notions of gender produce observable patterns of constraints and opportunities, which in turn differentially shape women's and men's day-to-day experiences and their access to valuable societal resources.

#### **Objectives of the Course:**

This course will provide you with:

- an understanding of the differences between sex and gender;
- consideration of the ways in which we "do gender" in everyday interactions with other social actors and/or various institutions, and recognize the diversity of femininities and masculinities created out of those interactions;
- knowledge of various sociological and feminist perspectives on gender;
- an understanding of how gender plays out in work, education, media, families and relationships;
- opportunity to critically examine and evaluate the way gender impacts your own life

It is my intention to create an environment where we can appreciate the diversity of perspectives and experiences of the members of the class. Gender is a dimension at the very heart of one's sense of self. This can make it a very challenging, although highly rewarding, topic to critically analyze. It is imperative that we treat each other with respect, responding in a scholarly manner to ideas and arguments.

## Gender observation journal (20%)

Gendered expectations and practices often remain unquestioned in our daily lives. Weekly gender observation entries will prompt you to reflect on what gender expectations and practices you are seeing throughout your day-to-day lives, and how they affect you and others around you. The focus with this exercise is to critically reflect on what you are seeing, not merely report what you are seeing. Observations each week should pertain to the topics covered in class that week and should be illustrative of concepts, debates, ideas, controversies, etc. discussed in class.

Starting in week two (May 24<sup>th</sup>), you will submit one written observation via D2L Dropbox each week for a **total of 4 submissions**. Each submission is worth a **maximum of 5 points**. The first dropbox is called "Observation #1" and will become available on May 24<sup>th</sup> after class (3:45PM). You will then have until the beginning of class ONE WEEK LATER (May 31<sup>st</sup> at 1:00pm) to submit your observation before the folder becomes unavailable.

More specific instruction will be provided in each week's dropbox. You will find more detailed instructions and each weeks' dropbox on  $D2L \rightarrow Content \rightarrow Gender$  Observations.

## Midterm #1 (20%)

The first 75-minute exam will include multiple-choice, true/false, and short answer type questions. Questions cover the assigned readings (irrespective of whether they were discussed in lecture), lectures, in-class exercises, discussions, and films. Please refer to the course schedule for chapters covered in the exam.

#### Midterm #2 (25%)

The second 75-minute exam will include multiple-choice, true/false, and short answer questions. Questions cover the assigned readings (irrespective of whether they were discussed in lecture), lectures, in-class exercises, discussions, and films. Please refer to the course schedule for chapters covered in the exam.

## Final Registrar Scheduled Exam (35%)

The 2-hour final exam will consist of multiple choice questions, true/false and short answer questions. Questions cover the assigned readings (irrespective of whether they were discussed in lecture), lectures, in-class exercises, discussions, and films. More detailed information will be provided in class prior to the exam. Please refer to the course schedule for chapters covered in the final exam.

Please note that the registrar-scheduled final exam period is June 28 - 30. Do not make travel arrangements until you know when the final for this class has been scheduled.

#### ABOUT THE MIDTERM EXAMS AND FINAL EXAM:

The exams will have multiple-choice, true/false and short answer questions. You will have 75 minutes for the midterm exams and two hours for the final exam. No books, notes or computers/electronic devices are permissible. Be sure to bring both a pencil (with eraser) and a pen to the exam. The exams will cover the textbook materials listed as well as lectures, class discussions and films. The final exam is not cumulative in the sense that earlier chapters and lectures will not be explicitly tested, but there will be the expectation that those earlier materials provide a foundation for your later work.

The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP) legislation disallows the practice of having students retrieve their work from a public place (i.e. outside an instructor's office, the department office etc.) If you would like to review the answers to the exam, you can make arrangements with the instructor to schedule a time to do so.
