Overview:

This is the second of two required statistics courses in Sociology at the University of Calgary. This course focuses on inferential statistics. This course assumes that you are familiar with all the material covered in SOCI311, which includes calculating descriptive statistics up through bivariate regression and basic use of the statistical software package, SPSS. Together, these two courses will provide you with the basic tools necessary to conduct, interpret and critique quantitative social science research.

In this course, you will learn how to calculate and interpret inferential statistics. You will become proficient using SPSS for inferential statistical analyses and you will conduct an independent quantitative research project using publicly available micro-data. Statistics is a language; like all languages, it is best learned through continuous usage.

Objectives:

1. To introduce you to the theory of inferential statistical analysis.
2. To introduce you to the basic methods of inferential statistical analysis, and develop your facility with these methods.
3. To teach you how to use SPSS to conduct inferential statistical analysis both skillfully and intelligently.
4. To illustrate and critique uses of social statistics.
5. To enable you to conduct an independent quantitative sociological research project using publicly available micro-data.

Requirements:

A. Exams:

You will have two mid terms and one final examination. The midterms will each be worth 15% of your final grade, and the final will be worth 34% of your final grade. The mid-terms will be held in class on Thursday 7 February and Thursday 14 March. The final will take place during the final examination period, 19-30 April, and will be scheduled by the Registrar. Exams are mandatory. If you fail to take any of the exams without documentation, you will automatically fail the course.

NOTE: The only acceptable reasons for missing an examination in this class, as listed in the Deferral of Final Examinations section of the University of Calgary Calendar (<http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/g-6.html>), are illness, domestic affliction, or religious conviction. If you miss a mid-term examination, and you provide me with the appropriate documentation, the weight of the midterm exam will be added to your final examination. There are NO MAKE UP exams in this class. If you miss the final examination, you must contact the Registrar's Office immediately.

B. Problem Sets:

Problem sets are provided at the end of each chapter in the textbook, and the answers to the odd-numbered exercises are provided at the end of the textbook. You are encouraged to do as many of the odd-numbered exercises as you can for each chapter, and to check your answers carefully. It is suggested that you complete the exercises *by hand, and in*

pencil, and that you show all your calculations. You are encouraged to work in groups on these problem sets. It is your responsibility to make sure that you understand and can do all the problem sets. If you have any questions on the exercises, you are encouraged to bring them up during class or in office hours. I am happy to work through any of the exercises with you, either in a group or individually. The problem sets form the basis of the examinations. Remember that on the exams, you will also be required to show many of your mathematical calculations by hand.

C. Lab assignments:

There are three mandatory lab assignments throughout the semester. Each of these assignments will be worth 12% of your grade, for a total of 36%. The lab assignments will be handed out *in the lab sessions*. It is your responsibility to get the lab assignments. The lab assignments are due at the beginning of LAB on 29 January, 5 March, and 2 April.

We will not accept e-mail submissions of lab assignments. Only hard copies of lab assignments will be accepted. Lab assignments must be typed and stapled.

The lab assignments will all relate to the micro-data you choose to analyze in the second week of class. They will be cumulative, as you will develop your project through the three labs.

There is a mandatory \$15 lab fee, which will be collected during the second week of classes. We will not grade your first lab assignment until we receive your lab fee.

NOTE: Late lab assignments will receive a grade reduction of 15% for each day past the deadline. The 15% grade reduction per day also applies to weekend days and holidays.

The following description of letter grades comes from the University of Calgary Calendar.

Additional Information:

A. FOIP:
