## Course Description

This course will explore critical perspectives on the sociological study of deviance and social control. The following questions will be addressed: What is the interactive connection between power, deviance, and social control? How do social forces affect popular understandings about deviance? What are some of the problems associated with how most people think deviance should be controlled? How does social control shape identities and influence social relations? By the end of this course students will have been exposed to the key historical frameworks, as well as some of the latest research in the field.

## Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete this course will:

1. understand the historical context of deviance and social control
2. evaluate classic and contemporary theories of deviance and social control
3. assess the relationships between power, deviance, and social control
4. articulate the interconnections between crime, deviance, and social control
5. develop a critical and self-reflexive lens in relation to the study of deviancy and social control

## Methods of Assessment and Grading Weights

**Mid Term Exam: Friday 15 October 2021** (worth **40%** of the final grade).

This exam, using multiple choice and true-false format, will be based on all materials covered on pages 1-108 in Adler and Adler (2016), Lectures 2 to 13 (including all slides, video materials, documentaries), and any assigned readings. **Within a 24-hour window (12.00am to 11.59pm on Friday 15 October)**, the time period for this exam is normally 120 minutes or two hours. But since it will be a **remote D2L test**, university regulations stipulate that students be provided with 50% extra time. Therefore, **students will have 180 minutes or three hours to complete this remote D2L quiz function exam**. A computer with a supported operating system and broadband internet connection will be required to complete this exam. If, during this exam, a student has any questions or encounters any problems, I will regularly be checking my email and will respond to them as quickly as possible. More detailed instructions on this exam will be provided.

**Participation Assignment: Due 5pm Wednesday 24 November 2021** (worth **10%** of the final grade).

In this course students will be required to submit a participation assignment. More specific details on this assignment will be provided.

### Final Exam Information

This exam, using multiple choice and true-false format, will be based on all materials covered on pages 109-251 in Adler and Adler (2016), Lectures 14 to 34 (including all slides, video materials, and documentaries), and any assigned readings.

The final examination will be scheduled by the registrar during the final exam period. The time period for this exam is normally 150 minutes or two hours and 30 minutes. But since it will be a **remote D2L exam**, university regulations stipulate that students be provided with 50% extra time. Therefore, **students will have 225 minutes or three hours and 45 minutes to complete this remote D2L quiz function test.** More specific details on the Final Exam will be provided.

It should be noted that a re-assessed grade may be raised, lowered, or remain the same.
