Course Description

On March 12th, 2012, the Parliament of Canada passed Bill C-10. This piece of legislation was an attempt to "get tough" on crime by introducing minimum sentences for drug trafficking, sex crimes, child exploitation, and some violent offences. Critics contend that the legislation was costly, caused overcrowding in prisons, and had little rehabilitative effect on offenders, and ultimately, did little to

deter crime. This class will introduce students to the structure and operation of the Canadian criminal justice system. We will examine how the various stages of the system function. This will include an examination of how crime is defined, measured, and dealt with by the police, the courts, and the correctional system. Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to identify the values of the Canadian criminal justice system, illustrate how informal justice manifests itself, and critically assess crime stories in the mass media.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

Students in Introduction to Criminal Justice should concentrate on how to:

- 1. Identify the main components of the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 2. Outline the general process that suspects go through when they are accused of perpetrating crime.
- 3. Identify and explain control philosophies.
- 4. Memorize important notable crime rates and trends.
- 5. Explain the challenges presented by policing society, dealing with the courts, and sanctioning the convicted.
- 6. Identify and assess viable alternatives to prison.

Required Textbooks, Readings, Materials, Electronic Resources

Grade Reappraisal

Within two weeks of the date the exam/assignment is returned, students seeking reappraisal of examinations or assignments must submit a written response to the instructor explaining the basis for reconsideration of one's mark. The instructor will reconsider the grade assigned and will then book a time with the student to discuss their work and rationale. It should be noted that a re- assessed grade may be raised, lowered, or remain the same.
