Course Description

This is a core course for students majoring in Sociology. It has several objectives:

- 1) to provide you with an introduction to the intellectual and social history of Sociology. (How and when did it become possible to study “society” in a systematic way? What topics were important to early social theorists and sociologists? How did these topics emerge from the social, political and economic contexts of the time?);
- 2) to acquaint you with the key ideas of some of the most influential social theorists of the period 1830-1930 and their contributions to modern Sociology;
- 3) to provide you with practical experience in reading, critically comparing and writing about original works of social theory and analysis;
- 4) to acquaint you with some of the ways contemporary sociologists use classical theory to examine contemporary issues and practices;
- 5) to provide you with an opportunity to consider contemporary issues and practices (e.g., gender, racialization, consumer society, social media, inequality) through the lens of classical theory, thereby evaluating the continuing relevance of the theory – while also building your skills as a critical sociologist.

Course Readings

The bulk of the course readings are combined into a course pack that is available in the University of Calgary Book Store. An additional three required readings can be accessed through the D2L site.

Learning Activities and Assessment

Quiz and Exams: There is one quiz (January 31), one midterm exam (February 28), and a registrar-controlled final exam (date to be determined). The quiz and exams will cover material from lectures and readings; they may include fixed choice, short answer and essay questions. Prior to the quiz and each exam you will be told what kind of questions to expect and how you should prepare.

Essay: This is a 4-5 page essay due March 21. In this essay you will use classical theory to critically consider a contemporary social situation. The topic will be assigned in February and essay guidelines will be given at that time. The grade for the essay will assess writing as well as content.

You can also book an appointment with someone who will meet with you to identify specific ways you can strengthen your writing. I strongly encourage you to check out these useful resources.

Instructor's Policies (Please read!)

1. **Technology use:** Laptop computers and tablets are permitted for the purpose of making notes or doing course-related work. 3. **Email:** I will answer email within 24 hours during the school week (often much quicker); I do not usually respond to email over the weekend, unless it is an urgent matter. Please check the course outline and the D2L site before emailing me with questions about due dates, requirements, or test formats. The information you are seeking may already have been provided to you. If you have questions about course content or want to discuss your participation in the course, let's talk face to face: in class, after class, or in my office.

4. **Posting lecture slides:** Some slide material will be posted in D2L before the start of class so that you can use it as a basis for taking notes. There will be information given in class that is not on the slides, as well as extensive discussions of the readings, and not all classes will involve slides, so it will be very important for you to obtain class notes for any days you miss. *I highly recommend that you set up a note-sharing arrangement with one or more of your classmates.*

5. **Plagiarism:** In accordance with University policy, I report all cases of plagiarism. The easy way to avoid this: *Don't download material from the Internet. Write your essays in your own words and properly cite all quoted material.*

6. **Missed exams:** If you must miss a mid-term exam for University-approved reasons, I will schedule a make-up exam for you, to be written as soon as possible during the Sociology Department's designated schedule for make-up exams.

7. **Grade reappraisal:** If you would like an exam or assignment to be reappraised, or if you have questions about your grade, contact me within two weeks of the return of the exam or assignment. I may ask you to put your request in writing for clarity and so I have a record.

8. **Rounding up final grades:** My decisions about whether to round up any final grades falling on the cusp between letter grades will take into consideration your overall performance in the course. I am most likely to round a grade up when (a) the grade is more than halfway to the grade above *and* (b) the letter grade for the final exam is higher than the cumulative final grade for the course.

Handing in Papers, Assignments

Deferrals

When possible, *please provide advance notice if you are unable to write an exam or complete/turn-in assignments on time*. All requests for deferral of a course component due to health reasons must be accompanied by written documentation as outlined in the University Calendar and should be obtained while the student has the health issue rather than after recovery.
