Course Description

Bodies are always there, in our lives and in society, although they have often been oddly absent in sociology. In recent years there has been an increased interest in bringing bodies (back) into sociology, extending our ability to recognize, theorize and empirically investigate the embodied and sensory character of human social practice and experience. This includes attention to ordinary practices of everyday life, as well as to the ways bodies are known and governed through contemporary discourses and modes of rule; it also involves examination of the ways that social inequalities are generated – and can be resisted or transformed – at the level of the body.

In this course we will explore a range of sociological theories and analytic approaches, and we will read empirical articles examining various social practices and experiences related to embodiment, in areas such as gender, racialization, health and illness, adornment, appearance, sport, body modification, and employment. We will work collaboratively with these resources to analyze embodied practices and discuss contemporary social issues, and each student will carry out an individual project of empirical research, using in-depth interviewing techniques.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Summarize, explain and critically discuss different sociological theories and analytic approaches relevant to the sociology of the body.
- Use these different sociological theories and analytic approaches to examine and analyze social practice and experience.
- Read and understand professional-level articles and be able to pick out, summarize and discuss the main information.
- Plan and conduct an in-depth, ethnographic interview focused on embodied practice and experience.
- Develop original, theoretically informed analysis based on interview data.
- Work collaboratively with others to develop analyses of contemporary social phenomena.

Course Format

This course will meet synchronously during scheduled class time on Tuesdays and Thursdays. It will involve lectures and class discussions/small group work. As this is an advanced seminar, regular attendance and active participation are key ingredients for both individual success and a stimulating collective experience. Assignment guidelines and some lecture slides will be posted in D2L, but this material will not fully replicate the lectures, practice sessions and class discussions taking place during synchronous sessions.

Methods of Assessment and Grading Weights

First assignment: This is a short (3-4 page) description of your own embodied practice or body technique of everyday life. Guidelines will be discussed in class and posted in D2L. *Due January 26*.

Midterm writing assignment: This is a set of 2-4 essay questions which will give you the opportunity to synthesize, work with, and critically discuss course materials. You will have two weeks to work on the assignment. *Due February 29*.

Research project and paper: You will conduct one in-depth, qualitative interview with someone who has firsthand knowledge of a particular embodied practice or experience, leading to a paper (12-15 pp.) presenting and discussing what you have learned. Detailed instructions for planning, conducting, analyzing and writing up your research will be given in class and posted in D2L. A short, written proposal for your research (identifying the topic of your planned interview) is *due on February 11* and must be approved by me before you can conduct your interview. You will be asked to speak informally in small group sessions about your research experience and your findings. *Research paper due March 29*.

Final writing assignment: This is a set of 1-2 essay questions which will give you the opportunity to synthesize, work with, and critically discuss course materials. *Due April 15*.

Article notes/summaries: You may submit summaries of up to 5 assigned articles throughout the semester. Each article summary should be about 1 page (single space) and is worth 2%. To receive credit, the summary must be submitted online by 12 pm on the day the article is to be discussed in class. Guidelines for what to include will be discussed in class and provided in D2L.

Seminar participation: Most weeks, there will be one small-group learning activity for which participation is recorded. You will receive credit (1%) each time you participate in one of these activities, up to a possible total of 10. (Break-out discussions will be a regular feature of the course, but only one session per week will count for participation credit. For-credit group activities will not always be announced in advance.)
