Overview:

This course provides an introduction to the sociology of mental health, with an emphasis on research concerning body image, dieting, and eating disorders. Dr. Bierman will conduct the first half of the course, focusing on the history of the field, theoretical traditions, and current research. Dr. Godley will conduct the second half of the course, which will examine research in psychology, sociology and public health on body image, dieting and eating disorders. Throughout the semester, students will work on their MA thesis proposals.

Requirements:

A. Reading:

Readings will be assigned for each day of class. You will receive the list of readings for each class at least one week prior. Please come to class every day having read the materials. Bring any questions or comments you have about the readings with you to share with your classmates. Please bring your copies of the texts to class, as we will refer to them often.

B. In-Class Participation:

You are encouraged to participate as fully as possible in classroom discussion. Please take classroom participation seriously; respect your peers' contributions, and provide feedback as constructively as possible. You will be graded on your ability to engage the readings and participate in classroom discussion.

C. Writing:

For some classes, you will be required to prepare written answers to questions provided by the instructor one week prior. These question responses are due 24 hours before we meet. You may email your responses to the instructors.

D. <u>Final Paper:</u>

The final paper, which will be a draft of your MA thesis proposal, will be due 28 April, at noon in SS922 or SS902. A full description of what is expected for the final paper will be provided in class.

Additional Information:

A. FOIP:
