COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course offers a history of sociological theory from its nineteenth-century origins to World War II. Its objectives are (1) to engage critically with established classical sociological theorists and texts and (2) to use these engagements as points of entry into ongoing debates about the nature and contemporary significance of classical sociological theory--debates about what constitutes a "classic" in sociological theory, how to study the classics and processes of canon formation.
