CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Health Assessment

Knowledge and basic skills needed to complete a health history and a holistic assessment of healthy individuals. Students will practice health assessment skills on each other.

DETAILED COURSE DESCRIPTION

Nursing 211, Health Assessment, is designed to assist you in acquiring beginning skills in health assessment and physical examination techniques. The process of observation is critical to clinical decision-making in nursing practice. This course provides you with a framework to gather a complete health history and the knowledge to develop basic skills in physical assessment. Supervised laboratory sessions allow you to practice skills and integrate theory using a problem-solving approach.

Nursing 211 is a clinical course with both theory and laboratory components. Within this course, the assessment and consideration of developmental stages, cultures, relationships, and how the individual is positioned in their environment will be addressed. You will have the opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills learned in this course in your first clinical course, Nursing 209.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students in Nursing 211 will be provided with opportunities to:

- 1. Demonstrate appropriate interviewing techniques and sensitivity to client comfort.
- 2. Differentiate between normal and abnormal physical findings.
- 3. Obtain an accurate, problem-oriented health history from a healthy individual.
- 4. Perform appropriate inspection, palpation, percussion and auscultation techniques.
- 5. Synthesize relevant history and physical assessment findings as the foundation to formulate a holistic 'picture' of a client.
- 6. Communicate findings of the health history and physical examination using accurate, concise recording and verbal reporting.
- Demonstrate beginning skill in clinical decision-making based on health assessment information.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimum passing grade for this course is C, 63.5%. Students MUST obtain at least 63.5% on the OSCE component to pass the course.

Lab Documentation (20%):

For each documentation assignment, your lab partner will be given a scenario describing the subjective experience of a symptom in one system: respiratory, abdominal, cardiovascular, neurological, musculoskeletal, head and neck. Following history-taking and physical examination of your laboratory partner, you will record and submit your handwritten subjective and objective findings. A narrative, descriptive style will be used to document actual assessment findings. Pertinent negatives, use of appropriate terminology and clinical language, and symptom analysis should be incorporated. You will submit six (6) written documentations: two practice documentations in labs 3 and 4 for feedback, and four documentations in labs 5, 7, 8, and 9 worth 5% each.

Online Terminology Quizzes (P/F):

Students will be required to successfully complete (achieve 100%) three online terminology quizzes. Students must redo quizzes until 100% is achieved for all three quizzes.

Midterms 1 & 2, and Final Written Examination (20% each):

Both the midterms and final examinations will be written during the term "block" allotted for NURS 211. All examinations will be multiple choice questions. The number of questions on the exam will be shared with the students one-week before the exam.

Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) (20%):

In mid-October, students will sign up for a 20-minute timeslot to do their OSCE. On the exam days (November 2 and 3, 2009), six OSCE stations will be set up in the Clinical Simulation Learning Centre (CSLC). Students arriving at their appointed OSCE timeslot will be randomly assigned to complete three of the OSCE stations. Each student will have 5 minutes at each of the three assigned stations to demonstrate his/her ability to complete a focused subjective or objective assessment. The OSCE is a critical element of N211; students MUST obtain a minimum of 63.5% on the OSCE to pass the course.

PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT DURING LABORATORY SESSIONS

Laboratory sessions are times for you to acquire confidence in eliciting health information and performing physical modes of inquiry on an individual in a supervised setting. Professionalism in the laboratory setting means that you are expected to demonstrate seriousness and maturity, to be on time, to attend, be fully present (mentally and physically) and prepared for each lab, to participate fully for the entire lab period, and to adhere to principles of safety, asepsis, and confidentiality. You are expected to actively participate in discussion and the performance of skills. Students exhibiting unprofessional conduct will receive one warning from the lab instructor. Failure to demonstrate professional conduct as described above will result in 5% being deducted from the final mark for the course. Five percent (5%) will be deducted from your final mark for each missed lab session unless the lab instructor has been notified and alternate arrangements have been made prior to the start of the lab.

GUIDE TO HEALTH ASSESSMENT LABS

The main objective of the health assessment labs is to practice skills required to obtain a relevant health history and physical examination on an individual. These skills will form the foundation of your clinical practice throughout your professional career.

Students are expected to complete the required readings and view the applicable DVD(s) **prior** to each laboratory session. You will be gathering data and practising examination techniques with your lab partner throughout the course. Please bring your stethoscope to all labs. To properly inspect and observe your partner, it is expected that you will use gowns provided in the lab for most of the lab sessions, i.e., assessment of the thorax, heart, and abdomen. You may wish to come to lab prepared with clothing that allows your partner easy access to limbs and joints (shorts, tank top, etc.). Practice in properly draping and providing for the comfort of your partner is part of this laboratory experience.

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Purpose

1 The purpose of this policy is to ensure a transparent, fair and consistent approach to managing and tracking student absences for the achievement of clinical/ laboratory course objectives and program requirements.

Within the Nursing Practice Standards established by CARNA (2005) it states that a nurse must ensure their 'fitness to practice' (pg.5). This means that the nursing student must be able to perform essential functions of the nursing role expected for the lab or clinical practice that they have been assigned to without any mental or physical disabilities/illnesses. Therefore, it is the nursing student's professional duty to maintain your state of health and recognize the impact ill-health may have on your patients and colleagues.

2 This policy applies to all undergraduate students in the Faculty of Nursing.

Definitions

- 3 In this policy:
 - a) "Absence" means unable to be physically present to engage in nursing practice activities related to the course.

- b) "Clinical make up time" equivalent to the number of hours outlined in the University calendar for the nursing course in question, and formally approved by the course coordinator,
- c) "Mandatory" means obligatory, compulsory, morally or legally binding.

Policy Statement

- **4.1** Clinical make up time will be implemented in situations where successful completion in meeting course objectives is in question.
 - **4.2** A medical note may be requested.
 - **4.3** Clinical make up time is not additional time to assist the student to meet the course objectives.
 - 4.4 To fulfill course requirements, attendance at all scheduled lab and/or clinical practice is required. If you are ill or experience an unforeseen circumstance, you must inform your Clinical Instructor and Course Coordinator as soon as possible. If you miss one or more lab/clinical days due to illness or unforeseen circumstance, you may be at risk for not successfully completing the course. You may be asked to withdraw from the course and complete the course requirements at a later date, or you will be required to make up the missed hours. Your situation will be reviewed by the Course Coordinator and Associate Dean, Undergraduate Programs.
 - **4.5** Travel/social/recreational activities will not be accepted as reasons for absence.
 - **4.6** It is an expectation that students plan vacations that do not interfere with any portion of the course dates in the term. Students are expected to consult the university calendar for term dates including withdrawal and add/drop dates for each academic year.
 - **4.7** Absences due to bereavement will be addressed on an individual basis by the Associate/Assistant Deans in consultation with the Course Coordinator (4.1 Applies)

Attendance Policy for Pregnant Students

- 4.8 The student is required to notify the Dean or designate in the faculty of Nursing in writing by the end of the first trimester if/when she becomes pregnant. The student may proceed in the program providing:
 - She has a letter from her physician to confirm the due date and the date at which the physician recommends discontinuance of clinical courses and return to clinical courses.
 - She is able to perform nursing duties as assigned. No special concessions or reduction in patient assignment will be made at any point during the pregnancy.
- **4.9** Failure to comply with these conditions may result in the student being asked to withdraw from the clinical portion of the program. This policy is in consideration of the health and safety of the student, the

student's baby, and the student's clients in clinical practice. (University of Lethbridge, NESA Student Handbook)

Special Situations

5 Requests for absences related to nursing scholarship and service learning will be considered.

Responsibilities

- 6 Approval Authority
 - ensure appropriate rigour and due diligence in the development or revision of this policy.

Course Coordinators

- make decisions regarding a clinical absence;
- collaborate with the Clinical Instructor and the Associate/Assistant Dean, Undergraduate Programs if necessary;
- sanctions the location and supervision of the clinical make-up time.

Implementation Authority

- ensure that University staff are aware of and understand the implications of this policy and related procedures;
- monitor compliance with the policy and related procedures;
- regularly review the policy and related procedures to ensure consistency in practice; and
- sponsor the revision of this policy and related procedures when necessary.
